**Preamble**

Mahajana Post Graduate Centre is an exclusive PG wing of SBRR Mahajana First Grade College (Autonomous). The tourism and Hospitality sector is one of the world's fastest-growing industries as well as the major source of foreign exchange earnings and employment for many developing countries. It is a labor-intensive industry providing plenty of opportunities for employment and entrepreneurship. The tourism and Hospitality industry has emerged as one of the key drivers of growth among the service sector in India. Thus, the Indian tourism and Hospitality industry offers excellent job opportunities for professionals.

The department of Tourism and Hospitality was established in 2007. This program helps students to learn about the industry and its major components like Food Production, Food and Beverage Service, Front Office operations, Accommodation Operations, Human resources, Computer Applications, Marketing Management, Accounts, etc. The course also offers three months on-the-job training in Hotel and Hospitality and helps students to build a strong career in the industry.

The department offers BBA (3-year degree programme in Hotel and Hospitality) to cater to the needs of the ever-expanding hospitality industry. This course is approved by University Grants Commission and affiliated with the University of Mysore. It is a six-semester full-time programme.

**1. Title and Commencement**

These Regulations shall be called the regulations for Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and Continuous Assessment and Grading Pattern (CAGP) for Undergraduate (UG) Program of the SBRR Mahajana First Grade College (Autonomous), Mysuru. These

Regulations shall come into force from the academic year **2020-2021**.

## **2. Undergraduate Graduate Program Offered**

Bachelor of Business Administration (Hotel and Hospitality) - 6 Semesters

## **3. Semesters and Program Structure**

UG degree programs shall be of six semester's duration.

An academic year consists of two semesters: Odd Semester and Even Semester.

A semester normally extends over a period of 16 weeks (6days per week) with 90 working days.

### **Program structure**

- a. Every course offered may have three components: Lecture (L), Tutorial (T), and Practicals (P). The tutorial session consists of participatory discussion/self study/deskwork/brief seminar presentations by students and such other novel methods.
- b. The credit pattern for a course (L: T: P) shall be decided by the respective Board of Studies (BoS).
- c. Credit means the unit by which the course work is measured. One hour session of Lecture or Tutorial per week for 16 weeks amounts to 1 credit. A two-hour session of Practical per week for 16 weeks amounts to 1 credit per semester. The total duration of a semester is 20 weeks inclusive of the semester-end examination.
- d. A course of 3 to 6 credits will be evaluated for 100 marks. A course with less than 3 credits will be evaluated for 50 marks. A course with practical will be evaluated for 150 marks (Theory - 100 marks and Practical -50marks). For any other approved course, the evaluation method shall be decided by the respective BoS.
- e. A Project Work/Dissertation of 6 credits shall be evaluated for 100 marks.
- f. Industrial Training in the Hotel industry of 6 credits shall be evaluated for 100 marks.
- g. Presentation and Viva-voce for both project and training report shall be evaluated for 50marks each respectively.

## **4. Definitions**

Discipline Specific Course (DSC) is a core course, which should compulsorily be studied by a student as a core requirement of the program.

Elective Course is a course that can be chosen from a pool of courses. It may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the student's proficiency/skill.

- a. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) is a course offered under the main discipline/subject of study or a Project/Dissertation.
- b. Project/Dissertation is an elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to project work. A student has to study such a course on his/her own with the advisory support of a faculty member.
- c. Generic Elective (GE) is an elective course chosen from an unrelated discipline/subject with an intention to seek exposure beyond discipline/subject.
- d. Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) may be of two types: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). AECC courses are mandatory courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement viz., Environmental Science, Indian Constitution, and English/Modern Indian Languages (MIL)/Communication skills. SEC courses are aimed at providing hands-on training, competencies, skills, etc.

**Note:**

A candidate shall study any ONE of the languages viz., Kannada, Hindi, Sanskrit, Urdu, Telugu, Malayalam, Persian, Arabic, French, German, Russian along with English language (compulsory).

- Out of the two languages selected, one of the languages shall be an Indian Language. However, in the case of foreign nationals, the requirement of an Indian language may be waived by the College.
- Indian Language means any one of the languages mentioned in the VIII Schedule of the Constitution.
- The College may permit the private study of a language by a student, if there is no provision for instruction in that subject in a college and allow the student to appear for the examination in the subject without insisting on attendance. Such candidates will not be evaluated for any IA marks. However, for the final grade calculation, 80 marks are equated to 100marks.
- Deaf and Dumb, Spastic, Mentally Retarded, and Learning deficiency students

shall study only one language.

- Change of language will not be permitted during the period of the program.

Fee means the Admission/Examination/other fee prescribed by the Management for the UG/PG programs from time to time.

The grade is a score assigned to the percentage of the marks awarded in a course.

Grade Point (GP) of a course refers to the product of credits and the Grade earned by the student in that course.

Grade Point Average (GPA) refers to the performance of the student in a given semester. GPA is the ratio of the total grade points earned by the student in all the courses to the total number of credits assigned to the courses in a semester.

Subject Grade Point Average (SGPA) refers to the ratio of the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses of all the semesters of a single subject to the total number of credits assigned to the courses of all the semesters of that subject.

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) is the ratio of the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses of all the semesters to the total number of credits assigned to the courses of all the semesters.

## **5. Subject Combinations**

- A list of all the approved subject combinations under UG programs is given in Annexure-II.
- In addition, any other combination of subjects under any program may be included after the approval of the Academic Council of the college.

## **6. Eligibility for Admission – UG - B.B.A. (Hotel and Hospitality)**

- a. A candidate who has passed the two-year Pre-University examination conducted by the Pre-university Board of Education, Government of Karnataka, or any other examination considered equivalent by the University is eligible for admission to the First Semester of the UG program.
- b. Students who have done a Three years Diploma after X Standard are also eligible.
- c. A Candidate who has passed 3 years Diploma in commercial or Secretarial Practice conducted by the Department of Technical Education, Government of Karnataka is eligible for admission to 3rd Semester B.B.A. directly. However, such a candidate has to pass the languages and other compulsory Papers viz., Constitution of India and Environment Studies of first two semesters.
- d. A Candidate who has passed 2 years Diploma in Business Administration conducted by the Department of Technical Education. The government of Karnataka is eligible for admission to 5th Semester B.B.A degree course is subject



to the condition that the candidate has to pass papers in languages and all compulsory papers of the first Four Semesters B.B.A.

- e. Students who have passed any Job Oriented Course (JOC, 10+2) / I.T.I. (10+2) / Diploma in Computer Applications for the Visually Impaired (JSS Polytechnic for the Differently Abled Institution) are eligible to join the first Semester B.B.A.
- f. Students who have passed the following JOC (10+2) are eligible to join the first Semester degree program as detailed here under :

## **7. Medium of Instruction**

The Medium of Instruction shall be English/Kannada as decided by the concerned Board of Studies (BoS). However, a student can write the examination either in English or Kannada.

## **8. Scheme of the Program**

The minimum duration for completion of a UG Program is six semesters. However, as per the double the duration norm of the SBRR Mahajana First Grade College (Autonomous), Mysuru, the maximum period permitted is six semesters counting from the first semester.

A student has to earn 146 credits for the successful completion of a six-semester UG program. The distribution of credits for different courses is given in Annexure-II.

Only such students, who successfully earn 146 credits in six semesters respectively, without break, shall be considered for declaration of ranks and or medals.

## **9. Course Registration**

Every student is assumed to have registered for all DSC courses offered in that semester.

A student is permitted to choose any of the DSE courses offered by the department during that semester.

A student is permitted to choose any of the GE courses offered in the college during that semester.

A student has to register for any MIL along with the English language in the first four semesters.

A student has to register for Environmental Studies and Indian Constitution in the first two semesters compulsorily.

After admission, a student can opt-out of the combination registered earlier, and opt for another combination giving valid reasons within two weeks from the date of admission. This is subject to the condition that the student will be able to fulfill the required minimum attendance in the newly registered course.

A student may be permitted to discontinue the program before the conduct of the C1 examination.

## **10. Attendance**

Only those students, who have  $\geq 75\%$  attendance in each course, shall be permitted to take the C3 examination for that course.

A candidate who does not satisfy the requirement of attendance shall not be eligible to take the examination of the concerned course.

In the case of a candidate who represents his institution/University, Karnataka State/Nation in Sports/NCC/NSS/Cultural or any Official activities shortage of attendance up to a maximum of 15 days in a Semester may be condoned, based on the recommendation and prior permission of the Head of the Institution concerned.

The Head of the Department shall notify the list of all students who have  $< 75\%$  attendance in each subject by the beginning of the 16th week of the semester. A copy of the same should be sent to the Controller of

Examination of the college. If the course is a core course, the student should re-register for the course which is offered.

## 11. Transfer within University and from Other Universities

Transfer to a different institution within the University is permitted only at the beginning of the academic year.

A Candidate seeking transfer to a different institution within the University of Mysore should have completed all the courses/papers of the previous semesters.

A Candidate from any other university can join a program of this college only at the beginning of the academic year.

A Candidate from another university seeking admission by transfer to the college should have completed all the courses of the previous semesters.

## 12. Continuous Assessment

Assessment and evaluation processes happen in a continuous mode. However, for reporting purposes, a semester is divided into three discrete components identified as C1, C2, and C3.

**The performance of a student in a course will be assessed as explained below:**

The outline for continuous assessment activities for C1 and C2 will be proposed by the respective BoS. This will be based on a test / assignment / tutorial / viva-voce / seminar / any other.

The first component, C1, of assessment is for 10%. During the first half of the semester, the first 50% of the syllabus should be completed. This should be completed by the 8th week of the semester.

The second component, C2, of assessment, is for 10%. C2 will be based on the remaining 50% of the syllabus. C2 will be completed during the 15th week of the semester.

A student cannot repeat C1 and C2.

During the 18-20th week of the semester, a semester-end examination shall be conducted by the College for each course. This forms the final component of assessment (C3) for 80%. The student has to apply for the C3 examination as per the College Notification.

The BoS will decide the scheme of valuation for the C3 component of the Practical.

The project report shall be evaluated as per the scheme recommended by the relevant Board of Studies. C1 and C2 components of the project shall be

evaluated by the Project Supervisor for 30 marks each. The C3 component of the project shall be evaluated jointly by the Project Supervisor and one External Examiner for 40 marks.

### 13. Evaluation for C1 and C2

Students will be evaluated for each course by the teacher(s) handling that course.

After the evaluation, the results have to be announced. The course teacher has to obtain signatures of the students registered for the course in a register maintained specifically for the purpose, indicating that they have no objection to the marks awarded within 5 days from the date of announcement of the marks.

In case a student is not satisfied with the assessment, the student can make an appeal to the Grievance Cell within 5 days from the date of announcement of the results. Otherwise, it is presumed that the student has no objection to the marks awarded.

The student can appeal to the Grievance Cell by paying the prescribed fee as fixed by the College. The Grievance Cell is empowered to take corrective measures. The concerned course teacher has to provide all the relevant documents to the Grievance Cell. The decision taken by the Grievance Cell is final.

### 14. Examination and Evaluation for C3

Question paper setting [Scheme of valuation (Theory) - Annexure-III ]

- a. The question paper pattern for the C3 component of each course shall be prepared by the respective Boards of Studies.
- b.
- c. Each course shall have a Board of Examiners which shall prepare, scrutinize, and approve the question papers for all the courses of that subject.

Valuation

- a. Before the valuation, the answer scripts shall be coded.
- b. There shall be a centralized and single valuation of the C3 theory answer scripts.
- c. C3 component of the Practical [Scheme of Valuation (Practical-Annexure III)] will be conducted with two examiners of whom, at least, one is an external examiner.
- d. Any examiner on the approved panel of examiners of the College not belonging to the parent college is an external examiner.



- e. The project shall be evaluated as per the scheme recommended by the relevant Board of Studies. C1 and C2 components of the project shall be evaluated by the project supervisor for 30 marks each. The C3 component of the project shall be evaluated jointly by the project supervisor and one external examiner for 40 marks.

Results will be announced within one month of the completion of the examination.

## 15. Photocopy, Retotalling and Revaluation

A student can avail of the following services by paying the prescribed fees to the College within 15 days from the date of announcement of the results:

- Photocopy of the answerscript(C3)
- Viewing and Retotalling.
- Revaluation.

The Retotalling facility shall be provided for checking whether all the answers have been valued, and the totaling is correct. In case any answer or part thereof has not been valued, that part may be referred to as another valuer, and marks so awarded shall be added to the total. In case there is a mistake in totaling or carryover of marks from the inside sheets to the facing sheet, then the Controller of Examination shall have it corrected with the approval of the Principal.

The result of Retotalling shall be announced within five days from the date of applying for the same.

The result of the revaluation shall be announced within twenty days from the last date of the receipt of the application.

Revaluation shall be Carried out by an external examiner who has not valued that particular script.

- a. If the difference between the original marks and the revaluation marks does not exceed 15 percent of the maximum marks prescribed for that theory paper, the higher of the two will be the final award of marks.
- b. If the difference between the original marks and the revalued marks is more than 15 percent of the maximum prescribed for that theory paper, such scripts shall be valued by another external examiner outside the college and marks awarded will be final.
- c. In case one or more answers are not valued by the original examiner, then the marks awarded by the subsequent examiner as far as these answers are concerned

shall be taken as they are, without averaging with the marks of other answers.

- d. In cases where there is a difference between the original marks, first revaluation marks or/and the second revaluation marks clearly indicating that a particular examiner has been erratic in his/her valuation, then such cases shall be referred to the Malpractice and Lapses Inquiry Committee to establish whether or not any punitive measures need to be taken.
- e. If there is a complaint of unfair valuation of answer scripts for a group of students, the Principal may, after a preliminary inquiry, order for revaluation of the concerned group or the entire set of students in the paper concerned. After such revaluation, a random sample of 10% of the answer scripts, subject to a minimum often, shall be referred for review.

## **16. Passing Criteria**

A student is considered to have passed the course, only on securing a minimum of 40% from C1, C2 and C3 put together.

A student can take the C3 exam irrespective of the marks scored in C1 and C2 of a particular course.

In case a student secures less than 30% in C3 or absence for C3, the student is said to have not completed the course. The student shall complete the course by re-appearing only for the C3 component of that course when College conducts the examination. The student carries the marks already awarded in C1 and C2.

On successful completion of the UG program, a final grade card consisting of grades of all courses successfully completed by the student will be issued by the College.

## **17. Makeup Examination**

For students who could not attend C1 or C2 due to medical reasons/extraordinary circumstances/ participation in Sports/NCC/NSS/any other extracurricular activities (approved by the College), C1 and C2 exams will have to be conducted for them separately before the 15th week of the semester.

Makeup examination (only for C3) shall be conducted only for the 5th and 6th semesters. This examination shall be conducted by the College within 15 days from the date of notification of results. This shall be only for those students who do not fulfill the passing criteria specified earlier.

There is a provision for Improvement examination in C3 for all semesters. The candidate can appear for the examination by paying the prescribed fee.

The marks obtained in the Improvement exam shall be final.

## 18. Percentage and Grading

If P is the percentage of the marks secured by a candidate in a course (C1+C2+C3) which is rounded to the nearest integer, the grade, G earned by the student in that course will be as given below.

Where C is the credit value of the course.

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)

**Credit Points for the paper (CP)** = No. of Credits assigned for the paper X Grade Point secured for that paper

SGPA indicates the performance of a student in a given Semester. SGPA is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester.

Note: SGPA is computed only if the candidate passes in all the courses (gets a minimum P grade in all the courses) of the semester.

$$\text{SGPA of a Semester} = \frac{\text{Total Credit Points in the Semester}}{\text{Total Credits in that Semester}}$$

#### Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

CGPA refers to the Cumulative Grade Point Average weighted across all the semesters. CGPA is obtained by dividing the total number of credit points (CP) in all the Semesters by the total number of credits in all the Semesters. The final result at the end of the semester is declared in the form of CGPA.

$$\text{CGPA} = \frac{\text{Total CP of I Sem} + \text{II Sem} + \text{III Sem} + \text{IV Sem} + \text{V Sem} + \text{VI Sem}}{\text{Total Credits of I Sem} + \text{II Sem} + \text{III Sem} + \text{IV Sem} + \text{V Sem} + \text{VI Sem}}$$

#### Classification of results

The final grade point to be awarded to the student is based on CGPA secured by the candidate and is mentioned below:

**Equivalent/Overall percentage** =  $10 \times (\text{CGPA} \times 0.5)$  (or said to 50.5 % in case CGPA = 5.55)

The overall percentage in a subject is  $10 \times \text{SGPA}$ .

The overall percentage in the program is  $10 \times \text{CGPA}$ .

### 19. Class Declaration

The final Qualitative Index to be awarded to the student is based on CGPA. It is given as:

## **20. Nodal Officer, Subject Co-ordinator and Student Advisor**

Every college shall nominate a Faculty Member as CBCS Nodal Officer who will act as a liaison with the University and facilitate the implementation of the program.

The Head of the Department shall be the Subject Coordinator. He is responsible for the Student Advisor's work and student support services.

Every student will have a member of the faculty of the Department as a Student Advisor. All teachers of the department shall function as Student Advisors and will have a more or less equal number of students. The Student Advisor will advise the students in choosing elective courses and offer them all possible assistance.

## **21. Grievance Cell**

For every UG program, there will be one Grievance Cell. The composition of this cell is as follows:

- Principal (or his/her representative).
- Heads of the Departments.
- One senior faculty member from each Department.

## **22. Discipline**

Every student is required to maintain discipline and decorum both inside and outside the campus in accordance with the instructions of the college and also as per the instructions issued by the University of Mysore/Government of Karnataka/UGC from time to time regarding Student Conduct Rules.

Any act of indiscipline of a student is first to be considered by the Disciplinary Committee of the college for necessary action. If the issue demands more serious consideration, the act of indiscipline will be reported to the Principal who will initiate appropriate action.

Principal may suspend a student pending inquiry depending upon the prima facie evidence.

The suspended student may appeal to the Principal whose decision will be final and binding.

### **23. Others**

Any issue not specifically mentioned in these regulations shall be decided by the Principal in consultation with the appropriate bodies of the College.
