Regulations for

National Education Policy - 2020 [NEP] Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programand Continuous Assessment and Grading Pattern (CAGP)

For Undergraduate Program 2021-22

- ❖ All the Guidelines of NEP and Internationalization, Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) and Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programs offered in Higher Education Institutions will be adopted.
- ❖ Bachelors of Visual Arts (B.V.A.) is a Professional Four-year course under Arts and Humanities.
- ❖ BVA course includes specialization of visual art programs like Painting, Sculpture, Graphics (Printmaking), Applied Art, Photography & Photo Journalism and Art History

Program Structure & Eligibility for Admission

- 1. Every course offered may have three components: Lecture (L) Tutorial (T) and Practical's (P). Tutorial sessions consist of participatory discussion/self-study/desk work/ seminar presentations by students and such other novel methods.
- 2. The credit pattern of B.V.A. course (LTP):
 - A) Credit means the unit by which the course work is measured. One hour session of Lecture per week for 16 weeks amounts to 1 Credit. Two-hour session of Tutorial or Practical's per week for 16 weeks amounts to 1 credit per semester. The total duration of a semester is 20 weeks inclusive of semester end examination.
 - B) In the B.V.A. degree program, Department of Painting, Sculpture, Graphics [Printmaking], Applied Art and Photography & Photojournalism courses are considered as practical oriented courses. The Department of Art History course is considered as a theory oriented course. The theory subjects of Painting, Sculpture, Graphics [Printmaking] i.e. Art History and Philosophy of Art will be conducted & syllabuses prepared by Department of Art History.

- C) The ratio of all practical oriented courses is 70% of practical's and 30% of theory. The ratio of theory oriented courses is 80% of theory & project and 20% of practical's.
- D) In practical's, each subject includes: 2 Credit Tutorial (T) and 4 Credits of Practical's (P). In theory, each subject includes: 2 Credit Tutorial (T) and 4 Credits of Lecture (L).

Definitions:

- 1. Discipline specific course (DSC) is a core course which should compulsorily be studied by a student as a core requirement of the program.
- 2. Elective course is a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses. It may be very specific of specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the student's proficiency/skill.
- a) Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) is a course offered under the main discipline/subject of study or project/dissertation.
- b) Project/Dissertation is an elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to a project work. A student has to study such a course on his/her own with advisory support of a faculty member.
- c) Open Elective (OE) is an elective course chosen from an unrelated discipline/subject with an intention to seek exposure beyond discipline/subject.
- d) Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) may be of two types: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC),
- e) AECC courses are mandatory courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement viz, Environmental Science, Indian Constitution and English/Modern Indian Languages (MIL) Communication skills,
- f) SEC Courses are mandatory courses may be of two types: Skill Based (SB) and ValueBased (VB) courses are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills, etc.

Note:

A candidate shall study any TWO of the languages viz., English, Kannada, Hindi, Sanskrit, Urdu, Telugu, Malayalam, Persian, Arabic French, German, Russian.

- Out of the two languages selected, one of the languages shall be Kannada Language. However, in case of foreign nationals, the requirement of an Indian language may be waived by the University. And they most study the functional Kannada in any one semester of first year.
- Indian Language means any one of the languages mentioned in VIII Schedule of the Constitution.
- The University may permit private study of a language by a student, if
 there is no provision for instruction in that subject in a college and
 allow him/her to appear for the examination in the subject without
 insisting on attendance. Such candidate will not be subjected to any IA
 marks. However, for eventual calculation 80 marks is equated to 100
 marks.
- Deaf and Dumb, Spastic, Mentally disabled and Learning deficiency students shall offer any one language.
- Change of language will be permitted during the end of 1st year (2nd semester) or beginning of 2nd year (3rd semester) of the program.
- 3. Fee means the fee prescribed by the University for the UG programs from time to time.
- 4. Grade is a score assigned to the percentage of the marks awarded in courses.
- 5. Grade Point (GP) of courses refers to the product of credits and the Grade earned by the student in that course.
- 6. Grade Point Average (GPA) refers to the performance of the student in a given semester. GPA is the ratio of the total grade points earned by the student in all the courses to the total number of credits assigned to the courses in semesters.
- 7. Subject Grade Point Average (SGPA) refers to the ratio of the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses of all the semesters to the total number of credits assigned to the courses of all the semesters.

8. Cumulative Grade Pointing Average (CGPA) is the ratio of the total credit points earned by the student in the course of the semesters to the courses of all the semesters.

First year Program

All specialization programs had common Visual Art Introduction Course/Foundation Course on beginning of BVA Course. First and second semester -1st year (**Level 5**) contains all specializations papers of the college / Institution - Discipline Specific Course (DSC), Open Electives (OE), Ability Enhancement Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) Papers.

Entry 1: The entry requirement for Level 5 is Secondary School Leaving Certificate obtained after the successful completion of Grade 12. (10+2)

Or

A candidate who has studied a two-year foundation course in visual arts with languages recognized by the University as equivalent therein by this University.

Or

2 years Foundation in Visual Art / 2 years JOC / 2 years ITI of any subject (with Languages) /Diploma in Visual Art / 3-year Diploma Course with any subject can be eligible.

Entrance Test

A candidate who satisfies the minimum qualifications shall be called for an aptitude test in the Institution on the dates notified by the Head of the Institution for selection of eligible candidates for admission.

Intake

The total number of candidates for admission in the B.V.A. first Semester is 60 only and shall be done on the basis of the merit obtained in the above said aptitude test.

Reservation of seats

Reservation of seats for B.V.A. first Semester shall be made as per Government orders in force from time to time.

Exit 1: A certificate will be awarded when a student exits at the end of year 1 (**Level 5**). The first year of the undergraduate program builds on the secondary education and requires 48 credits during the first year of the undergraduate program for qualifying for an undergraduate certificate.

Second year Program

Specialization course will start individually from third semester onwards with Discipline Specific Course (DSC), Open Electives (OE), Ability Enhancement Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) Papers.

Entry 2. The entry requirement for Level 6 is a certificate obtained after completing the first year (two semesters) of the undergraduate program. A program of study leading to the second year of the Bachelor's degree is open to those who have met the entrance requirements, including specified levels of attainment, in the program admission regulations. Admission to a program of study is based on the evaluation of documentary evidence (including the academic record) of the applicant's ability to undertake and complete a Bachelor's degree program.

Allotment of seats

Allotment of seats to the Specializations / Departments is preferred in third semester of the B.V.A. degree program(2nd Year).allotment of sets shall be limited to the distributed number of seats available in each department and shall be done on the basis of the merit obtained in the concerned department and subjects in 1st& 2nd semester. If a choice is practical oriented courses, concern department subject & Fundamentals of visual Arts will be considered. In case of theory oriented course Fundamentals of Visual Arts & Languages considered.

There is no any change in the choice of a department in the whole program. It has to be finale in third semester admission only.

Exit 2: At the end of the 2nd year, if a student exits, a diploma shall be awarded (Level 6). A diploma requires 96 credits from levels 5 to 6.

Third year Program

Specialization course will be continued with Discipline Specific Course (DSC), Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) Vocational Studyand Internship Papers.

Entry 3. The entry requirement for Level 7 is a diploma obtained after completing two years (four semesters) of the undergraduate program. A program of study leading to the Bachelor's degree is open to those who have met the entrance requirements, including specified levels of attainment, in the program admission regulations. Admission to a program of study is based on the evaluation of

documentary evidence (including the academic record) of the applicant's ability to undertake and complete a Bachelor's degree program.

Exit 3: On successful completion of three years, the relevant degree shall be awarded (Level 7). A Bachelor's degree requires 140 credits from levels 5 to 7.

Fourth year Program

Specialization course will be continued with Specialization course will be continued with Discipline Specific Course (DSC), Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Vocational Study and ResearchPapers.

Entry 4. An individual seeking admission to a Bachelor's degree (Honours/Research) (Level 8) in a specified field of learning would normally have completed all requirements of the relevant three-year bachelor degree (Level 7). After completing the requirements of a three-year Bachelor's degree, candidates who meet a minimum CGPA of 7.5 shall be allowed to continue studies in the fourth year of the undergraduate program to pursue and complete the Bachelor's degree with Research.

Exit 4: On the successful completion of the fourth year, a student shall be awarded a degree (Honours/Research). A Bachelor's degree (Honours/Research) requires a total of 180 credits from levels 5 to 8, with 40 credits at level 5, 48 credits at level 6, and 48 credits at level 8.

Open Elective seat limitations

Our Institution is a practical oriented professional course. All the courses are studio oriented, that's why the open elective seats are limited 5 to 15 only for each discipline and it depends on availability & facilities in the departments. If students apply more than limited seats, the entrance test and vivo will be conducted by concerned departments.

Medium of Instruction, Course Registration, Attendance, Continuous Assessment, Evaluation for C1 & C2 (Internals -IA), Examination and Evaluation C3, Passing Criteria and Percentage & Grading will be followed as per University Instructions.
