REGULATIONS, GUIDELINES AND SYLLABUS

For

M.A IN BUDDHIST STUDIES

Eligibility : The Admission to this course is basically Buddhist Studies or any graduate from University of Mysore or Other University or other faculties which is recognized and considered Equivalent to University of Mysore is also eligible.

Duration of Course : Two Academic Years with Four Semesters



Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) Syllabus for M.A. in Buddhist Studies
Semester and Credit Pattern: Session 2021-22

General Information:

1. Semesters 1 and 2 will be for M.A. Part 1 and Semesters 3 and 4 will be for M.A. Part II.
2. There shall be minimum 16 weeks in each Semester.
3. There will be 5 Papers for each Semester. First three papers will be hard core and fourth and fifth papers will be soft core. There will be two groups each, candidate can select one group.
4. There will be 100 marks in each paper, out of which 70 marks will be for University Examination and 30 marks will be for Internal Assessment, consisting of assignment, seminar and test.
5. There will be 4 credits in each paper –for University Examination and one credit course of the any will be of one clock hour per week running for 16 weeks.
6. For each paper the passing marks will be 40 out of 100.
7. The students will be allotted a **Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)** after clearing all the 4 Semesters as indicated below.
