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## **BACKGROUND OF THE WORKSHOP**

As per the National Commission for De-notified, Nomadic and Semi Nomadic tribes There are 1500 Nomadic / Semi-Nomadic Tribes and around 150 Denotified Tribes, which make about 11 Crore of India's population. Traditionally the tribe amongst the most disadvantage communities in the country are the Denotified, Nomadic and Semi-Nomadic Communities (DNCs). These communities are hard to reach, less visible, and therefore frequently left out. While most DNTs are spread across the Scheduled Castes (SC), Scheduled Tribes (ST) and Other Backward Classes (OBC) categories, some DNTs are not covered in any of the SC, ST or OBC categories. Denotified, Nomadic and Semi-Nomadic Communities are considered to be the most deprived sections of Indian society. The nomadic and semi-nomadic communities move from place to place in search of livelihood. As a result, they are frequently left out. They have been culturally, historically, politically and economically deprived. Till now, their life is a stretched tale of misery and discrimination due to the lack of a means of livelihood and the stigma of criminality attach to them by the deskbound society. Hence to address the issues related to these communities there is a need for special attention. Development of the DNTs and NT has been given one of the major attentions by all the Governments in India during all five years plan on account of the socioeconomic backwardness of the tribes. Also a lot of provisions has been brought in to the constitution to safeguard their basic interests. A study team remarked that tribal welfare should aim at the prospective within reasonable time focusing their historical origin and identification. Advancement of the social and economic life of the tribes with a view to their gradual integration with the rest of country on a footing of equality is need of the hour.

## **OBJECTIVES OF THE WORKSHOP**

### **A.OBJECTIVES**

- 1.To reveal the past culture and customs of the nomadic and semi nomadic tribes by examining chronological documents as well as other sources of information on their lives and history;
- 2.To find out the historical origin of various nomadic and semi nomadic tribes groups that exists today and merged with other major tribal groups;
- 3.To reassess pre-colonial debates in deconstructing and reconstructing a vision of development that ensure to meet universal needs of survival, justice and human dignity of sustainable social transformation of nomadic and semi nomadic tribes groups;

4.The find out the role of politics, social movements, community involvement, and civil society and their engagements with combating social exclusion of nomadic and semi nomadic tribes groups in India;

**B.Sub themes;**

- 1 History of origin of NT(nomadic groups) and semi nomadic/DNT in India/Karnataka ;
2. Ethno historical identification of DNT /NTgroups (both existing and sub-merged);
- 3.Socio-economic, political and legal status of DNT/NT groups during British period;
4. Tracing the developmental history of nomadic and semi nomadic groups ;
5. Social exclusion of DNTs/NT and measure for inclusion
6. Issues of DNTs /NTs focusing Karnataka /South India 7.Other Related Topics

**Selection Procedure:** Submitted abstracts will be refried to an expert committee for blind review process. Selection committee decision will be the final and binding and no scope for further enquiry etc. **Timely papers** (prepared just for this seminar in the last minute) and **fake data/fabricated/falsified /plagiarized** papers will be summery rejected. Scholars /experts who are working on this topic and the tribal people from the different DNT/NT communities themselves are especially encouraged. We cont select all submitted papers.

\*\*Papers dealing with any particular DNT/NT tribes will be preferred. Purely general papers/based on secondary data will not be considered. Publications of the selected full papers will be done later **(Main sessions will be in Kannada and Parallel Sessions will be in English)**
