The objective of the course is to provide a broad understanding of Constitutional values practiced in India. It concentrates on the basic principles, ideals, evolution and pragmatic application of the Constitution. It seeks to empower the students to grasp the importance of the principles of the Constitution in addressing the contemporary issues and challenges. It also looks for preparing students to be analytical, responsible and informed of their rights and duties, required for establishing an egalitarian society.

The 10 Marks, reserved for Internal Assessment, can be awarded based on the performance in Test/ Assignment/ Seminar/Field Visit. This is to be done by means of C1 and C2, each for 05 Marks. The Question Paper for 40 Marks Theory Examination, consisting of Six Questions, each carrying Ten marks and only Four Questions have to be answered. The duration of Examination is Two hours.
